  - o The Young at Heart Spiritual Healing Seminar.
- Added emphasis and commitment will be given to our youth fellowship and the integration of all our youth ministries. Beginning Sunday May 1, we will engage in "Reboot 2.2." This "Reboot" will reclaim our Youth Fellowship as we meet together for fellowship, fun and study. We will seek to reclaim our traditions including the Youth Conference at Montreat.
- The Associate Pastor Search Committee has been nominated by the Nominating Committee and a congregational meeting have been called to elect the APNC on May 1st. Their work will be initiated very quickly. The success of this APNC will guide our church for years to come.
- FPCVB continues to evaluate the sanctuary's fatigue and health as a result of aging and damage from years of flooding. We have engaged the services of a structural engineer to evaluate the health and vitality of our facilities. Our facilities need attention. Doing nothing is not an option; it is either repair or develop.

These are examples of four issues that are being addressed. The needs they represent wait for no one.

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At First Presbyterian Church we believe we are living through a time of most potential. We are in a position of strength to address the challenges we face. We are excited about all that God is doing in our midst and we are thankful that we are in a position to respond in healthy and productive ways.

We are asking that you pray for all that we are seeking to accomplish. Keep yourself informed and keep your church accountable. Volunteer and support as you are able! Possibly Chaucer may have added to his proverb, "Time and tide waits for no man; so, **stop procrastinating; do it now.**"



#### Spotlight on our Artist in Residence: Sheila Lougheed

If you have ever had the opportunity to meet one of the most energetic, funny, authentic, and unique people ever to walk this earth, you know your life will never be the same. I am honored to be writing this Spotlight on my dear friend, our Artist in Residence, Sheila Lougheed. The youngest of three daughters, Sheila was born and raised in Danbury, CT, in an Irish-Catholic family. You'd never know it today, but as a child she could be described as shy, confused, and misunderstood. Clearly, she overcame that in adulthood!



Sheila has always loved art in all of its forms. If you could be creative with it, she wanted to do it. This was readily apparent when she was only 2 years old, when upon moving into the first house her father bought, Sheila found a bucket of red paint and gleefully started painting anything and everything



she could; the garage, the barn, and even the dog. She wondered why her father was not too enthusiastic about her "early works", but luckily he recognized her talents later on. The best thing about Sheila is that she truly enjoys entertaining and delighting others. Always the busy bee, she and her sisters were accomplished Irish Step Dancers, and eventually Sheila taught an adult dance class. She became a bass drummer entirely by accident, when a newly-formed Pipe Band in Danbury started rehearsing in the same space Sheila used for her dance classes each week. The Pipe Major, frustrated at the lack of rhythmic knowledge in his current drum corps, approached Sheila after a class and said, "Can you dance with your hands the same way you do with your feet?", and handed her a pair of bass drum mallets. She became a member of the drum corps immediately, performing on Tenor and Bass drums for many years with the Celtic Cross Pipes & Drums and eventually joining the Vero Beach Pipes & Drums here in Vero Beach, where she met Dr. Jacob Craig.

Growing up, Sheila had always wanted a house full of children, but sadly that was medically not in the cards. Instead, she spent 20 years volunteering at Special Needs Children's Homes and Shelters in Connecticut. Always caring for others, Sheila then became a therapist (including art therapy), and eventually settled into a career as a Court Liaison for Alternative Incarceration Centers. Her job was to help reformed inmates get out of jail and back on their feet. It was at the courthouse where she met David Holzbach. Ironically, David's job was the exact opposite- an attorney whose main job meant that he was usually partly responsible for sending those folks to jail in the first place. Sheila and David worked alongside (yet against!) each other for many years. When Sheila was only 32 years old, she was diagnosed with Colon Cancer. Throughout the ordeal, she remained close with David and eventually they began dating while she was undergoing chemotherapy. Sheila said, "I looked at myself with my hair falling out and sores all over my body and said 'if this kid comes back for a 2nd date, he's a keeper!" Well, he did, and the rest is history.

Before her father, Robert, passed away in 1993, David flew down to Lake Worth, FL to meet him and her mother to ask for their daughter's hand in marriage without Sheila's knowledge. Blindsided but delighted, Sheila accepted David's proposal and they were married in 1994. Sheila's cancer returned at ages 40 and 50, but by the grace of God she is currently in remission and feeling great!

Sheila and David moved to Florida to be closer to her mother, Peg. Not surprisingly, Sheila had no problem making new friends and eventually she followed some of them to Sebastian, where they live now. They are the proud pup-parents to Arthur, Henry, and LillithElizabethTaylor - two West Highland Terriors and a Scottish Terrior, respectively. Taking her art talent by storm, she now has a garage full of art supplies, canvases, and probably enough paint to open her own art academy. Her mentor, Frits VanEeden, asked her to work with him in his main studio and they have become good friends. Her favorite artists, whom she draws inspiration from, are Georgia O'Keefe and Jackson Pollack. Shei-



la's work has been exhibited in many galleries throughout the Treasure Coast, including the Foosaner Museum in Melbourne. Both her friendships with Frits and a serendipitous meeting with Jacob Craig in 2015 (when she joined the Vero Beach Pipes & Drums) have been a "literal Godsend". Sheila says, "One of the things that's clear as a bell is that God wanted me down here to meet and work with Frits VanEeden and Jacob Craig. They are both such kind gentlemen, not ego-driven, polite, genuine, and a delight to work with. They regularly get the job done with guidance, truth, and kindness."

Sheila feels blessed to have been a part of the art community here in Indian River County- not only serving as our Artist in Residence for the Galleries at First Pres, but also as Gallery Director of the Sebastian River Art Club (SRAC). She regularly offers classes and more at the SRAC's main office on Main Street in Sebastian. You'll find Sheila's work throughout our campus. Most notably, her beautiful Series of 9 paintings each depicting a different Lenten theme, culminating in a beautiful 12-foot-tall Pentecostal painting of a dove (pictured left), can be found hanging on the walls along in the main staircase of the Center for Christian Life. Most of these paintings were created live and in person in the back of our sanctuary during Sunday Services in our 2018 Lenten Season.

Dr. Robert Gamble is a presbyterian minister who returned from Ukraine to speak with us last month during one of our Wednesday Night fellowship dinners. The event was well attended, and many folks came just to hear him. Since 2006, Dr. Gamble has been the Executive Director of This Child Here, a nonprofit organization that seeks to find families for homeless children. The organization's goal, as stated on their website: "For every child, a home; every child a family. Every child needs to love and be loved by parents. Every day in a building without a functioning mother or father, is another day of childhood development delayed and denied." Dr. Gamble offered exceptional insight into the situation in Ukraine and the needs of homeless children and youth. We would like to share this message from him below. 07.04.2022. Irina and her children came to us from the Luhansk region. She plans to live in Izmail, where her children are safe. We bought her groceries, baby food, diapers -\$41

April 11, 2022. Anna and her children came from Kherson. We brought them food, diapers, baby food, hygiene products -\$43.



April 11, 2022. Diana's family has been living in the university dormitory for almost a month. Before that, the children were hiding from the bombing in the basement of Nikolaev, they were very scared. Today, children study remotely at school, participate in sports sections of the city and really want to return home. Food, hygiene products - \$33.

#### Ted Miller: Banking on Christ as His Savior

Ted Miller and his wife Lynn were attending First Presbyterian Church Christmas week in 2007, snow birds wintering in Vero Beach from their home in Pittsburgh, PA. Rev. Dr. Timothy Womack leaned his elbow on the pulpit and said to the congregation, "You might not know it, but God is going to get you... so pay attention." That resonated with Ted. "I will never forget it," he says. "It wasn't that I had forgotten God. It was just that I parked Him in a secondary place while I was building a career, having a family, and concentrating on the current crises of the moment. I had been in spiritual hibernation."

During his teenage years, Ted had been very active in Hollywood First Presbyterian Church in Hollywood, CA. "At 16, I remember Rev. Dr. Louis Evans Sr. asking those in a Sunday evening service who wanted to accept Jesus as their Savior to quietly raise their hand," Ted says. "With tears streaming down my cheeks I raised my hand." A natural leader, Ted soon became president of the Youth Choir, the Youth Group and formed a high school Bible Study. At Hollywood High School he not only became president of the student body his

senior year, but his track coach would have him lead the team in prayer prior to a track meet."God had changed my life completely."

Ted's early life was difficult. His mother and father divorced soon after he was born. He went back and forth living with his mother and father and finally at the age of eleven chose to rejoin his mother and sister in Canton, Ohio. "My mother Genevieve was an absolute salvation for my sister and me," he says. "She put us in the back seat of a 1953 Chevy with her sewing machine and our clothes and we headed west. As state residents of California, college tuition was inexpensive. Ted graduated from UCLA in January 1961. Throughout his high school and college years, he always had part time jobs. In 1960, while still in school, he and Joyce Clary married. "I had \$1.95 in my pocket," he says. Wedding gifts provided enough money for a honeymoon. On returning from his honeymoon he received notice to report to Lackland Air Force base in San Antonio, Texas for basic training with the California Air National Guard. The Guard unit was called to active duty in 1961. After 13 months active duty, Ted received a direct commission as a 2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenant and served eight years in the reserves.

Ted started a banking career with focus on real estate lending upon college graduation. His fatherin-law was CEO of a prestigious bank in Beverly Hills and retired at the end of 1964. His father-in-law was asked to do a financial turnaround of a bank in Miami, FL, by banking regulators in Washington. He agreed if Ted was hired, too. "It was the greatest learning experience of my early life," he says. His father-in-law was cleaning house, getting rid of existing management department by department. With each termination, he would put Ted in charge until he could fill the slot with an experienced individual. Ted would say, "Dad, I don't know anything about being cashier, etc. of a bank." His fatherin-law would say, "You will figure it out." Within 18 months the bank was in good financial shape.

A real estate management company for a Boston Real Estate Investment Trust (REIT), headquartered in Coral Gables, FL., hired Ted. He eventually became President of the management company and managing Trustee of the REIT. The REIT was funded by selling commercial paper backed by about \$600 million lines of credit supplied by banks around the world. Back in the early 70s that was a lot of money. The real estate market tumbled in 1974. The commercial paper market collapsed and the bank lines of credit were drawn upon to pay off the commercial paper outstanding. The banks were concerned as they never imagined having to fund their lines of credit. Ted, another Trustee of the REIT, and the senior officer of the lead bank for the credit facility spent the better part of 1974 working with the banks to extend their credit facilities. Ted was home only 30 days out of the year in 1974. "Not good for my wife and our daughters, Pamela and Gillian."

Tired of traveling all of the time, he welcomed a call from a headhunter for an interview with Mellon Bank in Pittsburgh, PA. He was hired to



manage their real estate lending department and eventually was promoted to Executive Vice President, part of senior management. But then a major crisis came in Ted's life. His wife Joyce had been a diabetic since her teenage years. A leg amputation and being on dialysis was too much for her body and she died of a heart attack in July 1988. His daughter, Gillian, was a junior in college and his daughter Pamela was married and living in Philadelphia. Ted felt that he probably had had his priorities a bit misplaced. Career had taken precedent to a lot of time he should have given to family.

He quit his job at Mellon and relocated to Bradenton, FL, managing a small real estate development company with ties to Pittsburgh. Lynn, who was to become his wife, was working at Mellon Bank in Corporate Events. A mutual friend at Mellon suggested Lynn try to get in touch with Ted when she visited her parents in Clearwater, FL. Lynn called Ted, they went to dinner. "I had never called a man before but the Vice Chairman of Mellon insisted," says Lynn. "When I spoke with Ted, I just heard a small voice in my head say you need to meet with him." After a long-distance courtship between Pittsburgh and Bradenton, they married. He was married to Joyce 28 years. Lynn and he have been be married 32 years.

"I have been so fortunate," he says. "Both of my wives share the same right values, high principles and consideration of others. God was still looking after me."

The economy once again was not too kind to real estate in 1991. Ted left the development business and joined a former Mellon executive trying to save a bank in Kansas City, MO. Ted commuted between Kansas City and Bradenton, FL. This bank was taken over by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) and now part of Bank of America. Lynn desired they relocate to Pittsburgh to be closer to her parents. They started a small ice cream business in 1994, sold the business in 2007 and bought a winter home in Grand Harbor. They now are permanent residents of Vero Beach. Ted has been an Elder and trustee in the church and is moderator of the First Presbyterian Men's Fellowship that meets each Tuesday at 7:30 to 9:00 am at J.C Cannon's. "I have always believed that it is more important to do the right things as opposed to doing everything right," he says. "In attempting to be useful to our church, both Lynn and I hope to be doing the right things, with God's help."
