

At the beginning of March, the Christian world began the season of Lent as we journey towards Easter. There are many ways Christian traditions celebrate Lent and Easter. Some celebrate Easter with candles and midnight vigils while others celebrate at the beach, in a folding chair with a blanket for a sunrise celebration. Nowhere in scripture does it say we will always love every rabbi or every priest or every pastor. Nowhere in scripture does it say I will agree with every decision and policy expectation of an elder or deacon. Nowhere in scripture does it say that "it's all about me!"

Musician Spotlight: Churchill Cooke

Churchill Cooke has been a member of First Presbyterian Church since 2017, but his family ties to our church go back much further. Did you know that we have had three generations of Cookes in our congregation?

Churchill grew up outside of Pittsburgh, PA. He graduated from Penn State University with a Bachelor of Science in Music Education. After college, he moved to Santa Fe, NM, where he held his first music position at a Catholic School in 1973. During that time, Churchill's parents retired to Vero Beach and, being Presbyterian, immediately began attending First Presbyterian Church. Churchill would fly down to see them during Christmas and eventually moved to Vero Beach in 1978 for one year. He met his wife to be, Sandi, during that year. Sandi is from Vero Beach and a member of First Presbyterian as well.

After they began dating, Churchill says "I lured her to follow me back to New Mexico as I really loved that state." They eventually were married, and taught for ten years in various towns in New Mexico. They had their daughter, Barbara, while living in Ruidoso. Sandi, whose true passion was bilingual education (Spanish), discovered greener pastures in central California. The young family moved to Visalia (near Fresno) where both Churchill and Sandi taught in schools for twenty-seven more years. Churchill taught elementary music until his retirement in 2016. During his forty-three years of teaching music in NM and CA, he also spent most of it as a church choir director for the Methodist, Lutheran, Disciples Of Christ, and Episcopal/Anglican churches.

After they retired, the couple decided to return to Vero Beach in 2017. Barbara, her husband, and their son Arlo eventually followed her parents to Vero Beach in 2020, and Churchill's sister and her husband moved to Sebring around the same time! The Cookes have taken Florida by storm, and their extended family- including Annie Kachele, Ryan Bueno, their kids, and their mother Maryann Renz, are all members of First Presbyterian Church.

Churchill wanted to finally offer his musical expertise to the denomination he grew up with, and honor the church that took such good care of his parents during their time here in the 80s and 90s. Upon his arrival in Vero Beach, he met with Dr. Jacob Craig about how he could help in the music department. Jacob put him to work immediately. Churchill really enjoys playing in the praise band, playing the gathering music, and most of all with the help of Sandi, leading the music for the Deacons Sing.

Along with music, Churchill has two more passions you might not know about - bicycling and skiing! He used to love bicycling to work while living in California and eventually his commute evolved into road cycling. As Churchill got more and more into shape, he began doing bike centuries (100 mile rides). While skiing isn't so much an option here in Florida, Churchill and his wife have embraced the bicycling world since moving here. They have been involved with the Vero Cycling organization, and became ride leaders every Tuesday afternoon for casual riders. They also have a recumbent tandem bike. Churchill says, "I still ride a lot of solo rides but enjoy riding tandem with Sandi even more." He also helps rehabbing bikes with Bike Walk IRC every Tuesday morning. These refurbished bikes are then donated to anyone who needs transportation here in Vero Beach. Churchill is currently training to become a licensed cycling instructor (LCI) through the League of American Bicyclists where he will be able to teach adults and children safe cycling.


Churchill and his family want to thank everyone at First Presbyterian for making a home for the second generation of Cookes. He says, "You've really made us feel loved and blessed."

Profile of a Presbyterian Woman: Jill Compton

She's played Maria in "The Sound of Music," Fiona in "Brigadoon," and leading ladies in countless other community theater productions. Now, Jill Compton blesses the FPC choir with her talent. During COVID's early days, the Comptons and the Tooheys comprised the fabulous foursome that led hymns live and in person, augmenting the full choir's taped performances. Said Dr. Jacob Craig, "When Jill and Roger joined the choir, I had no idea how crucial they would be to just about everything I do. Jill has become the proverbial lynchpin for so many things I am involved in."

Whether in a church choir or on a musical stage, Jill's passion for song is lifelong. Born in Weston, MA, her first solo was at age 5 in Weston's Baptist church where her parents sang in the choir. Jill sang throughout her childhood, and at Northeastern University she lent her stirring soprano talents to their chapel choir.

For the first five years after college, Jill was a physical therapist at Tuffs New England Medical Center in Boston – a job she found re-

warding for "the very real impact you can have on someone's life." Next came Rhode Island, where for five more years she traveled the state as Resource Coordinator for the National Spinal Cord Injury Foundation. She also did physical therapy at Rhode Island Hospital. Throughout, she honed her vocal skills in local choruses and graced the stage in community theater musicals.

When a new opportunity beckoned, Jill relocated to Annapolis, MD, to manage the Rehabilitation Department at Anne Arundel Medical Center overseeing cardiac, occupational & physical therapy, and speech/language pathology. There her life took an unexpected – but exciting -- turn when she was cast opposite a certain unattached Naval Academy professor in a local production of "Oklahoma." The pairing clicked both on-stage and off. Several years later, Jill and Roger were married on a friend's boat at Love Point on the Chesapeake Bay. The Comptons continued to sing in choral groups and community theater, and on Sundays raised their voices to the Lord in Presbyterian and Episcopalian churches. By Jill's count, the couple has performed together in some 35 musicals, including most from Broadway's Golden Age.

Roger retired from the Naval Academy after 32 years to become Dean of the Webb Institute of Naval Architecture in Long Island's Glen Cove. They kept their Annapolis home to enjoy summers there. When on Long Island, Jill often ventured into NYC to audition. She never made the Broadway stage but did do two national tours. "When the revival of 'Oklahoma' left Broadway, I traveled the country with it for 10 months," she fondly recalled.

After looking "all over Florida," the Comptons chose Vero Beach as the "smaller, nicer, at-the-beach community." Besides the FPC choir, they sing with Silver Tones, Vero Beach Choral Society, and the Indian River Estates chorus. Roger's 2 children from an earlier marriage have blessed them with 7 grandkids.

Ephesians 5:19 exhorts us to "... Sing and make music from your heart to the Lord." How thankful we are that Jill chose the FPC choir for her musical devotions.

Bill King: A Wealth of Kindness and Concern for Others

It is easy for Bill King to believe in a loving and wise spiritual Father because he was blessed with a loving and wise physical father. "When I began my career as a financial advisor at Merrill Lynch, my father, a third-generation lawyer, told me, 'Bill, you will have more impact on your clients' lives in two years than I will have had working with mine for a lifetime. Don't ever take that responsibility lightly.' Bill said, "I am mindful of those sage remarks every day as I make financial recommendations to my clients who I have the privilege of serving."

Although Bill is certain his father wanted him to join him in the practice of law, his father never voiced that desire. Instead, he allowed Bill to choose his own path. "I just enjoyed mathematics and chemistry and was good at them," he said. "When I attended Bucknell University in Lewisburg, Pa, I was a chemical engineering major and on graduation began a career as a chemical engineer with Celanese in North Carolina making polyester."



At 26, Celanese agreed to relocate him to its headquarters in Manhattan, NY, so he could pursue an MBA in finance at New York University. Always interested in finance, he made his first purchase of stock at age 14 with funds from his lawn moving service. "Once I had my master's degree, I decided that if I wouldn't invest \$100 in a textile stock, I shouldn't invest my career in the textile industry and looked elsewhere," Bill said. "My investment account was with Merrill Lynch and my broker was Jim Coleman. I asked to speak to Jim about what he did. After about five minutes he asked if I had a resume. Bill has been a financial advisor with Merrill Lynch for some 35 plus years.

And what a career it has been. Again this year, Bill was named to Barron's Top 1200 Financial Advisors and Forbes' America's Top 250 Wealth Advisors ranking him as the #1 financial adviser on the Treasure Coast. The King Group at Merrill Lynch has offices in Manhattan and Vero Beach. Bill is Managing Director of an eight-member, mutigenerational team ranging in age from 20s to 60s and evenly split with 4 women and 4 men. The King Group manages in excess of \$2 billion.

Bill had been an active member of the Brick Presbyterian Church in Manhattan where he had served Brick as a Deacon and an Elder. During coffee hour back in 2010, Libby was there with her daughter, Leslie, for confirmation class. Years later, in October 2017, Reverend Womack married Bill and Libby in Sicily. Libby has a degree in aeronautical engineering from Ohio State and is a pilot for American Airlines. She also was a pilot for Eastern Airlines, Donald Trump's East Coast Shuttle and US Airways. Bill has two sons, Andrew and Alexander, by his first wife. Andrew lives in San Francisco and is involved in an tech startup. Alex is a financial advisor with the King Group and resides in New York City. Bill also is step dad to Leslie who works in IT in Munich, Germany for the Dutch bank ABN AMRO.

Bill was raised in Potterville, NJ, a bucolic town of about 400 people located west of Morristown, NJ. As financial advisor managing accounts of clients with homes and second homes in many states, Bill could live just about anywhere and for a number of years he lived in Manhattan, Long Island and New Hampshire. "A decade ago, Vero Beach became home so we could be close to Libby's mother," Bill said. "I had tried to encourage Libby to come to New Hampshire with me, but I soon discovered that the pilot is in charge of flying the plane. I happily served as co-pilot on this matter." Bill and Libby make their summer home on Shelter Island, NY and enjoy flying, sailing, SCUBA diving, and skiing.

Bill and Libby have been members of First Presbyterian for seven years. Bill has served as Deacon and currently serves on the Generosity Committee. He is a regular at the First Presbyterian Men's Fellowship breakfast on Tuesday mornings at CJ Cannon's, where he regularly gives talks on the state of the U. S. economy.



Rev. Dr. G. Timothy Womack, Senior Pastor Psalm 126

Cost of Discipleship: Expect God's Greatness
