

Help in Our Weakness

As the pandemic continues, so many of us find ourselves frustrated, tired, and uncertain. The most vulnerable shelter in place, now going on months. Our teachers are discerning how they can teach and care for their personal health, their students' health, and their family's well-being. Medical personnel become infected and they pray that they do not infect their families. Hospital, convalescent, and residential visits are still almost impossible to offer or receive. Our friends respond with a lack of reason and engage in sheer fear as they hear of the surge in cases.

While the Apostle Paul might not have faced a pandemic, he and his church were not excluded from the reality of suffering. There were so many times that Paul was frustrated, tired and uncertain. It was in the midst of these moments that Paul's counsel was to rely on the "Spirit." In Romans 8:26, Paul lifts up this truth to his congregation,

"Likewise, the Spirit helps us in our *weakness*; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit *intercedes* with sighs too deep for words."

When we are frustrated, tired, and uncertain; when we have been hurt or when our trust has been misplaced we feel a sense of separation; in the midst of a pandemic, surrounded by social tensions and dealing with the normal stresses of life, separation is a genuine issue in our present lives. How do we overcome separation when we literally have to self-isolate?

Paul says we are to remember and embrace our faith in God through Christ. In Romans 8, Paul affirms in the midst of his weakness and separation this truth,

". . . all things work together for good for those who love God, . . ."
(Romans 8:28a)



Crying out in his weakness, in his uncertainty, in the lack of equilibrium in his life and leadership, Paul surrenders his weakness on the altar of faith when he affirms the power and presence of God in the crescendo of his argument,

"No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, *nor things present, nor things to come*, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." Romans 8:37-38

As you endure this time of pandemic and social stress; as you overcome illness and loss of income; as you bear separation and disorientation; remember, God is with you! The promise is:

- 1. That the Spirit intercedes for us.
- 2. In God, all things (even though some of those things are **not** good) work together for good for those who love the Lord (i.e. those who reflect God's love even in dark times.)
- 3. And, nothing... nothing... can separate us from the love of God in Jesus Christ our Lord.



Separation is a genuine issue in our lives. We will be separated physically from one another, from family, from friends; we will be separated as our children leave home and as we lose loved ones; we will be separated when we are hurt and our trust is misplaced; yet, and this is a big YET, "if God is for us, who can be against us!" As children of God, heirs of the Kingdom, know this day and, every day, "nothing can separate us from the love of Christ."

Be Strong! Be Well! Be Safe!

We are very excited to announce a Summer Series Strings Concert featuring our own Youth Orchestra, to be held on Sunday, August 9, 2020 at 3:00pm in the sanctuary. This concert will also serve as a fundraiser to benefit the Youth Orchestra's invitational trip to the Aspen Music Festival in Colorado next summer. The suggested donation is \$10 per person, to be collected at the door. As always, masks are required

to attend and only the first 100 people will be permitted into the sanctuary, so arrive early for a seat. If you do not feel comfortable attending in person, the concert will be livestreamed via facebook or on our website, firstpresvero.org (click on "Media", then "Concerts and Such" to find it). If you are unable to attend in person and are interested in providing the youth orchestra with a sponsorship or general donation please contact Dr. Jacob Craig for more information on how you can help.

On August 9th after the concert we will also offer a reception to celebrate the reopening of The Galleries at First Pres. Our artists Keith Mills, Suzan Phillips, and Donna Ware have been waiting patiently since things were put on hold in April to show you their outstanding work. The reception will take place after the Strings concert from 4:00-6:00pm. Bottled water will be provided, while masks and social distancing of 6 feet will continue to be required throughout the campus.

From that moment on, Tim took an interest in me.

He made sure I always had a place to live, money to pay for rent, people willing to take me out to eat, and a vision. Tim pushed me to have a vision for the youth ministry, for each student who came in the program, and for myself. Tim has always had a vision and I've rarely seen one of Tim's visions not come true. From deciding in 2005 to hire a recent college graduate to building relationships with other churches to mission opportunities to how he wanted a program to run to building the future Womack Center (you know they'll name the family life center that one day, right?)

Tim showed me how important it was to appreciate where folks came from, as he would always give me 5 pages of the back story after meeting someone for the first time. Heck, I haven't worked there in over 10 years and I still know half the people because of Tim's example of learning the story of people.

Tim has gone from treating me like a son to treating me like a little brother to now treating me as a colleague.

When I met Tracy, my wife, I wanted his approval and I wanted him to marry us.

When I applied to seminary and to every job since Tim has and will be my first reference.

When I was ordained, there was nowhere else and no other person I would want to take part in that celebration.

I find Tim's voice in my sermons.

I find myself accidentally saying "pres-terian" instead of Presbyterian sometimes.

Whenever I come to Vero Beach to see my in-laws, Tim is often the first one I tell, just so I can be around him because his presence, guidance, friendship, and family mean so much to our family.

I'm sure I'm like a little brother who gets under his skin, but I want to glean as much as I can as often as I can. My kids call him "Uncle Tim" when he isn't around.

When folks ask what my vision for my life is, I say, "I want Tim's job".... but only if Tim's there, too. I've always been 20 years younger than Tim, and so that means he started at FPC Vero Beach when he was my age. If I can accomplish half as much as Tim has in the next 20, I will call my career a success.

If I can touch one life nearly as much as Tim has touched mine, I will call my life a success.



My Take on School Options During This Unusual Time of Pandemic

As a teacher, I loved the beginning of the school year. I enjoyed labeling and writing my students names on everything, laminating new posters and cutting them out, and decorating my classroom. I know this year will be different for my teacher friends. I know they will work just as hard and be just as dedicated to their students on whatever platform they are teaching. I know they will show each child love as they develop their classroom community in whatever option they are teaching. I took a break from teaching in a classroom when I became a mom.

As a mom, I never dreamed I would be weighing different options to which I feel is the safest for my child and my family. I am sure that I am like many parents and weighed each option given by the school district. (Here are the choices given: Option 1. Traditional brick and mortar. Option 2. Online school/Virtual school. 3. Start online and transition to brick and mortar.) I played out each scenario in my mind. My husband and I read numerous articles, talked to our friends in healthcare, discussed the options with our teacher friends and family. But, the biggest thing we did was pray. In Philippians 4:6, we are told "Don't worry about anything, but pray about everything. With thankful hearts offer up your prayers and requests to God." So, this is what we did. We prayed for God's guidance, for forbearance, for our son's education, for the health of others and our anxieties we were feeling. We prayed for the teachers and administrators trying to offer the best options for families. We looked to Romans 8:26, for Spirit to help us when we couldn't find the words.

Then we came to a conclusion that worked best for our family. Our choice doesn't look like our friends' choices. It doesn't look like our neighbor's. It is ours. When someone discusses their school choice, remember it is what is best for their family. So, exhibit grace. Show forbearance. Demonstrate compassion. But above all-extend love.

Here are some of Tim's Missions through the years:

- 1) He did several trips through the Brevard Indian River Presbyterian (BIRP) mission organization back in the early 2000s. Several groups traveled to Ticul, Yucatan to help build a church. Tim made 5 trips.
- 2) First Presbyterian helped raise money and worked on many houses for Indian River Habitat. This was under the direction of several Associate ministers as well as Tim.
- 3) Several trips by our church were taken to Abram Kriel Kinderhaus (orphanage) in Potchefstroom, South Africa. Tim was on 3 of these trips.
- 4) More recently, in 2019, Tim participated in a mission trip with 5 members to our sister church in Cabaiquan, Cuba. He was also there in 2010.
- 5) Traveled to the Bahamas to teach Vacation Bible School and serve in a pulpit exchange.
- 6) Traveled to Mississippi to assist with relief efforts after Hurricane Katrina in 2005.

It is important to note that nobody ever expects gratitude for these selfless acts of kindness. However, in looking at the Mission history of a man who has changed so many lives for the better- it's no secret that we owe our thanks to Tim for dedicating his life to share the blessings of Jesus Christ with others. What a beautiful testament to the kind of wonderful man that he is.

The missions team would like to wish Tim a Happy 20th anniversary at First Presbyterian.

After she retired from teaching, they spent every summer in Maine where Dan was a Registered Maine Fishing Guide. While Dan took his clients fishing, Karen worked part time in the bakery of a fresh vegetable market where she made specialty breads and fruit pies. For fourteen years, they enjoyed their lakefront cottage and wonderful neighbors.

Five years ago, the Boylans were searching for a small town with little traffic and friendly people and they found their permanent home in Vero Beach. While visiting churches, they discovered First Presbyterian Church. The next week, Karen attended hand bell practice and became a member of the hand bell choir, which she loves, and the Boylans became church members.

Karen and Dan now live on North Hutchinson Island and love the peace and quiet of the beach. Karen became a Deacon and served for three years. During this time, she had a knee replacement, and created handmade "thinking of you" cards with "prayer crosses" and a Bible verse in the pocket.
