## Seeking God's Kingdom and Righteousness First!

25 "Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink; or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothes? 26 Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they are? 27 Can any one of you, by worrying, add a single hour to your life?

28 "And why do you worry about clothes? See how the flowers of the field grow. They do not labor or spin. 29 Yet I tell you that not even Solomon in all his splendor was dressed like one of these.30 If that is how God clothes the grass of the field, which is here today and tomorrow is thrown into the fire, will he not much more clothe you—you of little faith? 31 So do not worry, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?'32 For the pagans run after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them. 33 But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well. 34 Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own.

If we honor the words of Jesus by seeking *first* his kingdom and his righteousness, then no matter what befalls us, we have little for which to worry. In Matthew's gospel, we are reminded that we are burdened with so much worry. We are in a season of corporate life when we are worried about our health (Covid-19), we are worried about politics, justice, the economy, the election, and we are worried about our favorite institutions surviving (be they our favorite Cantina, Company, or Church). In Matthew, Jesus reminds us that worry can paralyze us through fear and anxiety. Jesus uses the anxiety of our food and dress and our drink. He reminds us that God will provide. We are told not to worry about tomorrow! We are told to allow each day, and its issues, to be sufficient for the day.

If we free ourselves from worry, fear and anxiety (all which have a tight grip on us these days) and we focus on God's kingdom and God's righteousness, we will endure. So as a church, if our members and friends focus each day on the Kingdom of God and God's righteousness, should the church worry? Certainly not!

When we focus on the Kingdom of God and God's righteousness, we are less consumed by our own needs and desires and we are more giving toward others. When we focus on the Kingdom of God and God's righteousness...,

...we give our *time* to serve the needs of others, and we realize what we can accomplish when our time is God's time;

...we give our *talents* to do the right things, and then we are truly surprised how God multiplies those talents;

...and we give our *treasures*. We realize the good in which we have invested and how much our investment matters to the worship around us.

When we worry less about life, and work in "right" ways with God, we will be fine - even in the midst of pandemic.

When we worry less about what tomorrow brings, we can thrive being "mindful" of today.

When we engage in "kingdom living," all will be given to you.

When we seek God's kingdom and righteousness first, all these things will be given to you. Thus, this stewardship season, I am not asking for money; I am asking for you to seek God's Kingdom and God's Righteousness! Then, everything else will be given as well.

In a season of worry, anxiety and fear, let's put First things First!


### Youth Ministry Happenings



Over the last few months, you may have noticed some work being done around the chapel. We are excited to tell you that the first phase is complete and we expect the chapel to be ready for use by January 2021!

Some of the changes being made include the removal of wood-rot and storm damage, and a new etched glass window featuring the Mathatas Cross.





The Samaritan Center is an inter-faith, transitional, temporary shelter for homeless families in Indian River County. Families experiencing 'homelessness' are most often plagued by a variety of financial, emotion-



al, social, interpersonal, medical, legal and parenting problems. In addition to giving a family temporary housing, the Samaritan Center provides intensive case management to address the factors that have caused the 'homeless' problem.

Programs offered families staying at the Samaritan Center include emotional support, parental training, medical referral, mental health counseling, life skills workshops, finance management, domestic skills training and ultimately- hope for the future of both the adults and children who make Samaritan Center their temporary "home".

In this program, 75% of all resident income within each family system is applied directly to a savings account in preparation for a housing solution upon that family's graduation from the Samaritan Center.

Twenty-four hour staff supervision is required to successfully provide and ensure the structure, discipline, guidance and safety required by the diverse family systems represented in our residence. Volunteers help fill in the gaps to support a smooth and consistent program operation.



#### Profile of a Presbyterian Woman: Emily Zeigler

This lovely young Presbyterian Woman is a welcome addition to our FPC family --Emily Ann Zeigler. Since becoming a member, you may have seen her at Sunday morning worship, ushering or tending to the sanctuary flowers as a Deacon. Emily brings a vitality and caring stewardship to our church, setting an example for all. Born in Cashiers, NC, she is the only child in her devout and devoted close-knit family. Emily and her parents attended the Methodist Church there where she was baptized. When she was eight years old, the family moved to Nashville, TN and there, she finished her schooling with graduation from a private Christian High school. During her high school years, Emily participated in Teen Court, a prestigious program where students are carefully selected and trained on the roles of the courtroom (defense attorneys, prosecuting attorneys, bailiff and jurors). They are sworn in and serve, once a month in a peer court that handles cases from juvenile first-time offenders.

While in high school, Emily also volunteered in a community service program, making weekly visits to the local nursing home. This is experience of helping staff with activities for residents, such as painting ladies' fingernails, reading to them and chatting with them, made a lasting impression.



Emily attended her Freshman year at Bowling Green University, Ohio. then travels took her back to Nashville, on to Dallas and finally to Vero Beach where her parents had retired. When she landed in Vero Beach in 2012, she found employment working at the Johns Island Club. Emily also began searching for a church. Her parents were life-long Methodists, but Emily began visiting other churches. When she came to First Presbyterian she was struck by the feeling of familiarity and warmth within the congregation. She reminisces, "The hymns and sermon by Pastor Tim and later by Pastor Michael were a blessing to me and, being there was so special that, in the serenity of the sanctuary, I often lost track of time. It just felt like home!" She began attending Sunday morning worship regularly and realized this was to be her church family. Sponsored by Patti Burns, she joined in November, 2014.

Emily became a Deacon and was mentored by Trell Adams and later by the late Peter Peck. She speaks fondly of both these former Deacons. While serving as a Deacon, she had the responsibility of distributing the Sunday morning Worship floral arrangements to shut-ins and nursing homes. Her training from her high school service gave her the experience and confidence to develop relationships there. Pastor Michael explained. "Emily took the care to separate the flowers into bouquets for the nursing home residents. She has a calling to serve and made this task something really special for them". She continued to visit the residents even after her Deaconate task was completed!

Now attending Indian River State College studying to be a Dental Hygienist, she is close to achieving this goal. This busy young woman is working parttime and attending classes, but finds time for Sunday morning worship, either in person or online, and spending quality time with her family.

Emily shares this as one of her many favorite Bible verses: Psalms 91:4 "He will cover you with his feathers. He will shelter you with his wings. His faithful promises are your armor and protection".
