Participate in our daily e-mail devotions beginning November 29th, take a prayer walk daily throughout Advent and Christmas, find a way to help a neighbor, focus on an act of daily kindness.

Christmas 2020 is "not the Christmas we wanted; it is the Christmas we've got." Let's play it as it lies! Let's see if this Christmas can be one of our most meaningful and memorable yet!

The following week, on December 20th, the Handbell Choir will perform some of their favorite Christmas music for your enjoyment during the 10am and 11:15am services.



A Simple Act of Kindness

Capt. Ives, piloting the Stena Vision, a 300,000 ton crude oil tanker, approaching the Delaware Memorial Bridge in the Delaware River. This was one of the largest ships ever to come up the Delaware.

Many years ago, on a cold Christmas Eve morning, I boarded a small freighter off the coast of Delaware from one of the South America countries, Columbia or Venezuela perhaps. Our orders were to proceed in from the Atlantic Ocean, steam 90 miles up the Delaware Bay and River to dock at a cargo terminal in Camden, New Jersey. There, the ship would discharge her cargo in the days after Christmas. The Captain and crew were excited to be safely in port for the holiday.

It was the custom, in those days before containerization and around the clock port operations, that the tugboats I would need to assist putting the ship into the dock would not be available after 5 PM Christmas Eve. Try as we might, with the Chief Engineer pushing the engines flat out, the

best we could do was arrive in Philadelphia Harbor after six o'clock. The tugs and personnel on the dock were long gone to their homes, and the entire waterfront was pretty much shut down for Christmas.

The Captain and crew were very disappointed to learn that they would be spending their Christmas at anchor out in the middle of the river. After talking it over with the Captain, I agreed that if I could get the ship close enough to the pier to land a couple of our own crew on the dock to handle the mooring lines, that I would try to get the ship into the dock and tied up. It was a risky maneuver without assist tugboats, but somehow we managed to get alongside and made fast without demolishing the pier.

As I was preparing to leave the ship, anxious to get home to enjoy my own Christmas, the Captain asked me if there was a church nearby, outside the terminal, where they might attend Christmas services. I advised him that the terminal was located in a very bad part of the city, and they best not venture outside the gates after dark. I was fortunate, however, to arrange through the Philadelphia Seaman's Church Institute, to have a van come to the ship later that evening. After exchanging "Feliz Navidad" with the happy crew, I left to get home in time to join my choir at our eleven o'clock Candlelight Service of Lessons and Carols and enjoy a wonderful Christmas with my family.

Several days later, by chance, I was assigned to sail the same ship from Camden out to sea. As I climbed the gangway, I was enthusiastically greeted by a number of the crew, smiling and calling out: "Muchas Gracious, Senor Piloto". When I arrived on the bridge, the Captain told me that a small bus had taken almost all the officers and crew across the river to the Basilica Cathedral of Sts. Peter and Paul in downtown Philadelphia, where they celebrated Christmas Mass in that beautiful, old historic cathedral. The Captain tearfully related that the Archbishop of Philadelphia had personally greeted them, blessing the crew and wishing them safe and happy voyages.

I was overwhelmed with their expressions of gratitude for a simple act of kindness that had brought them so much pleasure, thousands of miles from home, and had made Christmas truly meaningful for us all.

The Christmas Tree Cake Fiasco of 2009

Every year at Christmas, my mother makes a billion cookies (not an exaggeration) for the Christmas Eve cookie trays. I say "trays" in plural because there are usually at least 40 people present at the family's Christmas Eve "Italian Feast of the Seven Fishes" and, of course, an appropriate amount of cookies to feed all of our guests for several weeks. Usually, as part of one of the trays, my mother would include a box of Little Debbie Christmas Tree Cakes.

Eleven years ago, my father (Bob Hill, who regularly plays trumpet at First Pres) - who is also a Christmas tree cake connoisseur - ate all of the cakes before Christmas, leaving the cookie tray without one of its staple items. Mom was quite displeased, to say the least, and sent Dad and me out on Christmas Eve to find another box for the tray.

It is important to know that in the winter of 2009 something was afoot with Little Debbie's Christmas Tree Cake production. While these days the cakes can be found in piles in grocery stores nationwide, this was not the case in 2009. Dad and I spent several hours that Christmas Eve going all over Vero Beach in search of these elusive cakes to no avail. 3 Publixes, 2 Walgreens, CVS, Albertsons (back before it was a Wal-Mart Grocery), Target, 2 Dollar Trees, and Wal-Mart - with nary a coveted cake to be seen. We never really figured out what happened with the Christmas Tree Cake supply that year, but alas- we returned home empty-handed and my father was suddenly destined to a lifetime of never being able to live this down.

The next year, I swore it to be my daughterly duty to ensure the Christmas Tree Cake Fiasco of 2009 would not be repeated, and so for the weeks leading up to Christmas, I would purchase a box every time I was out at the store. I carefully wrapped each box, some in pairs, some individually, and even wrapped individual cakes themselves to put on the tree.

I gave them all to my dad for Christmas in 2010. His face as he opened box after box, finally realizing what was happening, was priceless. I think after all was said and done he had 9 or 10 boxes. The Christmas Tree Cake-fest was the highlight of Christmas morning.

Every year since then, I've made it a point to ensure that my father had an adequate supply of his own Christmas Tree Cakes so mom's cookie tray would go unharmed. And finally, on the 10-year anniversary of the Great Christmas Tree Cake Fiasco, I found the GREATEST GIFT EVER for my father: Little Debbie came out with a special BOX of 5 different kinds of Christmas tree cakes, and a custom "Little Debbie Christmas Tree Cakes" Hat and Scarf. It was perfect, and dad laughed harder than ever. I'm glad that our family has these silly traditions to go with even sillier stories. It keeps us laughing every year!

Profile of a Presbyterian Woman: Kim Conn

Who is the attractive Presbyterian Woman working the Sound Board at the Sunday Morning Worship services? As part of the A/V team, Kim Conn makes a valuable contribution to the life of our Sunday morning worship services. But, this Renaissance woman has many talents!

Kimberly Ann grew up with her parents and two brothers in Newcastle, PA. The family was raised Roman Catholic, but when Kim was "old enough to decide", she began attending and was confirmed in the Methodist Church. After high school, she worked at the Newcastle Newspaper rising to district manager, and later, as the Circulation Manager of the Daily Courier Newspaper in Connellsville, PA, just south of Pittsburgh. A benefit of this job was opportunities to work with the Pittsburgh Pirates organization at Three River Stadium.

A blind date for ice cream at a Dairy Queen introduced her to a young widower and father to four children, Glenn. She began attending the Saltsburg, (PA) Presbyterian Church where he was an active member. They were married at the church in 1998. Because Glenn's work at JVC Projectors required a lot of traveling, Kim became a full-time step-mother and homemaker. His business also moved them to Delaware, Ohio, their home for 10 years.

During the elections of 2002-3, Kim worked as an election poll Judge at Delaware's lovely Asbury Methodist Church. During this time, tragically and unexpectedly, Kim's mother had a stroke. Kim, angry and frustrated, sought spiritual guidance. That Sunday morning, the minister's sermon was so insightful that "It was like she was speaking directly to me!". Glenn and Kim soon joined that Methodist church where she became a trustee, and developed a successful outreach program. Kim also started her own house cleaning business, having the church as one of her many clients, as well as expanding her business with the parishioner's houses.

In 2016 Kim tragedy struck again when she lost both her brother and mother within a 3-month period. She questioned God—especially for her brother who passed far too young from a lingering illness. But her faith prevailed. This past year Kim lost her Father, after becoming his caretaker for his last few weeks of life. Her faith kept the spirit of God alive within her Dad's home. "My father passed while Glenn read Psalm 23".

When Glenn retired, the Conns welcomed the warmth of Florida and decided to move here. They arrived in 2009. With the urging of their neighbors, former FPC members Patty and Dave Franz, Kim and Glenn visited First Presbyterian Church and joined not long after. Glenn became active with the Presby. Men and Kim joined the A/V team. "Jerry first asked Glenn to help but Glenn suggested me—I jumped at it!"

Kim now works at Rock City Nursery. "I'm the one walking around with a baseball cap and gardening tools in hand". Once a month, she works at the Space Coast Honor Flight, a volunteer mission service organization that flies military veterans to Washington, DC seven times a year. Their spare time is taken with attending and showing their Classic VWs at Antique Car Shows and traveling with Harvey, their goldendoodle.

Kim's favorite Bible verse is 2 Timothy 4:7-8 "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. Henceforth there is laid up for me the crown of righteousness...to all who have loved his appearing."
