The Way of the Cross

This past month our Tuesday Morning Bible Study began examining the Gospel of John. In the Gospel of John, Jesus is famous for stating seven “I Am” statements. In these statements, Jesus confirms his unity with the Father and proclaims his divinity. One of the “I Am” statements simply affirms that, “I am the way.”

The early church first called themselves the “Followers of the Way.” To be a follower of the Way means that we are willing to bear the cross on the “Way,” or journey, as Jesus bore His cross. As we move from Lent to Easter, we must affirm the tension in which we live that calls us to bear the cross and resist the temptations of this world, temptations that pull us away from the calling of Christ.

It is clear that we live in a world where so many of us simply “want to hear what we want to hear.” There are many who refuse to hear the difficult commands of Christ that are often shocking and challenging. We often fail to hear that Christ calls us to do that which is difficult and not that which is easy or convenient. As my friend, Rev. Dr. Conrad Sharps noted, “The way of the world, is the way of ultimate death. The way of Christ, however, is ironically the way of the cross, the way of self-sacrifice, of obedience to God. The way of Christ often has a high personal cost to people who are true to the commands of the gospel.”

As we celebrate Easter this year, we are challenged to reexamine our lives and our faith in light of the cross and resurrection. Do we have the humility and courage today to hear Jesus' words and obey them with integrity in a world that can never understand? Are we willing to bear the cost of sharing the love of God in Jesus Christ? This is our challenge and our opportunity, as we follow the Way!

As we celebrate the resurrection this Easter, affirming the amazing love that God has for us, understanding the cost of such love, we pray that God would grant us the measure of wisdom, faith, and courage that we need to be followers of His way. For we must remember that Christ proclaims, “I am the way, the truth, and the life!”

God bless you all this Easter and may you continue to be blessed to be a blessing.

Upgrading Our Discipleship Ministry

I appreciate this congregation's culture of looking to upgrade our current ministries – looking for ways to improve what we are already doing. It fits well with our Presbyterian or Reformed historical mantra “Reformed and Always Being Reformed.” It has also been a blessing to get to know a number of people in our Cottage Meetings (and in other gatherings). In the Cottage Meetings, we invited your ideas for upgrades to our current ministries and several fell within the area of Discipleship or Christian Education. We have a few initiatives already being planned for various age groups in the church.

One discipleship ministry that has been important in my history has been Small Group Ministry; some congregations call these Life Groups. These are groups that meet every week or couple weeks. They often include fellowship, refreshments, Bible study, sharing concerns, and prayer together. Often, significant care is provided within small groups for difficult times for members. I experienced this significantly in my own crisis about 25 years ago in such a group.

Small groups are usually led by a facilitator, and I'm intentional about the use of this word. The small group facilitator is not necessary an expert on the passage nor a teacher in the group. The facilitator generally coordinates the schedule and keeps the group on task for the study. Ideally, the entire group studies the passage together and builds on what everybody else discerns in the passage. Sometimes, the discussion occurs after a video that comes with the study the group has chosen. I'd be very happy to help the group discern a focus and study guide that would work well for the group.

The greater church has a wealth of guides to study scripture. Some focus on a particular book of the Bible or portion of scripture; others are more thematic. Yet others focus on a method of studying a passage and invite participants to use a study Bible or other resource in their study. Groups sometimes decide to study another book related to faith, prayer, or other, similar topics.

I've been a part of groups that meet in homes, a coffee shop, a room in the church, or in other places.

I encourage you to consider being part of a group. I've developed many friendships within the groups I've participated and learned a lot from the group's wisdom. Even this last year, I was blessed in having dinner with two such friends when I was visiting Grand Rapids, Michigan, for a conference.

The Facilities Development committee led by chairman Phil Schwin has been working for years to conceptualize and plan for the new Sanctuary. Committee members have experience in construction, engineering, management, design and finance to aid in decision making. Their purpose is to provide oversight for the other new Sanctuary committees and to also vote on critical aspects including contracts, design and finance.

Early in the process, the Facilities Committee simultaneously implemented key contracts so that so that an integrated design could be developed.

- Proctor Construction company was selected as the General Contractor. Proctor was the GC for the CCL building, and has an excellent local reputation. The Proctor team was a critical partner in cost estimating and vendor selection in the design phase.
- Proctor recommended Leo Daly from West Palm Beach as the architect firm that was partnered with TLC Engineering of Melbourne.
- The Facilities Committee also hired subspecialties in Audio, Visual and Acoustical design so that the build process was integrated for electronics from the start of the design process.

Some of the more notable changes from the original proposals include:

- Optimizing the layout of canopies covering walkways and matching construction to the existing CCL design to save over \$300,000.
- Adding a low stone knee wall with the same brickwork to match the CCL.
- Changing the color of curtain wall windows tint to blue from the architect's proposed green tint.
- Allocation of funding to have a definable budget for different construction elements.
- Approving contracts, including the decision to split out some FPCVB managed contracts from the Proctor contract to save on management oversight fees.
- Raising the foundation elevation by 3ft and using a metal roof for hurricane protection.

Being good stewards of the gifts provided, the Facilities Development committee has sought out design optimization to reduce unnecessary costs in order to improve quality in key areas such as acoustics and aesthetics. Designs were also examined with maintenance needs and trying to future proof the church infrastructure.

New Sanctuary Fund

The Interior Design Team has been working on the new Sanctuary for over a year and a half. This diverse group has made careful selections on finishes and made and proposals to the Facilities Development Committee for approval into drawings. Some of the more notable changes from the original architect's proposal include:

- Development of an open two-story Narthex with Dalle de Verre up top to save half of the Dalle that was proposed by the architect to be stored. (Original proposal was a one-story Narthex with a stairwell in the front corner.)
- Placement of the large Dalle de Verre windows in the Sanctuary instead of the Narthex.
- Carpet in the Narthex instead of ceramic tile to reduce noise and a slip hazard.
- Terrazzo tiling placed under seating instead of polished concrete and terrazzo flooring instead of the originally proposed maple Chancel platform. The terrazzo is similar to what was in the old Sanctuary under seating and the Chancel platform.
- A full-size Chancel platform instead of a stowable temporary front. Shortening the main platform stairs to make room for placement of the Communion table. Added an accessibility ramp for choir members and musical instruments.
- ADA compliance was achieved by specifying level flooring, an outdoor wheelchair ramp, and automatic door openers. (Churches are not required to be ADA compliant and these features were not in the original plan.)
- The Audio, Visual and Lighting control booth was relocated over the vestibule entrance instead of taking up floor space in the Breakout Room.
- The Women's restroom was moved closer to the Bridal Make-up room.
- Following suggestions from the congregation, these ideas were refined:
- Diversified seating profiles in the sanctuary with additional seat padding.
- A full kitchen in the Breakout room with a curtain to cover it during services.
- A nearby storage pantry was added for the kitchen / Breakout room.

It is an exciting time for all of us at First Presbyterian Church to see the start of building the new Sanctuary! Thank you for your contributions to the capital campaign.
