

show true faith to those on the inside. Both these writings

May God bless you wherever you are this August. Remember, put FPCVB on your reading list.


PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN

Helping Dodgertown Children with School Supplies and Uniforms

School uniforms can actually save families money but the initial out put of money can be a lot for families who have several growing children. The start of school can be a real hardship for low income families.

In order for schools to be considered a title one school, which Dodgertown is one. 40% of the student population must be low income. There are many title 1 schools in Indian River county but we have focused on Dodgertown because their student population is 90% low income. We are ALL called by God to share His love for us. In the book of James Chapter 2 vs 14 it reads "My friends what good is it for one of you to say that you have faith if your actions do not prove it? Show me how anyone can have faith without actions. I will show you my faith by my actions."

Here in the midst of a beautiful community like Vero Beach we still find neighbors who are in great need and they are sometimes invisible to us. It is here God is calling us, both men and women, to reach out to care for His children because we can and we are able. Every child deserves an opportunity for success. Their success will be ours in the future. But more importantly it is our mission to share God's love locally as well as around the world.

MEN'S FELLOWSHIP

Presbyterian Men's Corner - John Barley's Life Story - Shared by Phil LoGiudice

This month I want to share John Barley's story with everyone. He wrote the following piece and I hope you enjoy reading it.

I grew up in Flint Michigan in the late 60's through the fall of 1985. My early church life was Sunday school at FPC in downtown Flint. My father was very active in the church. I remember him attending meetings on certain weeknights and hearing "deacon" for the first time while probably being 9-10 years old. My mother sang in the choir and my two older sisters also sang in the choir. They truly had the talent to sing, while I'm at my best in a moving vehicle by myself.

FPC of Flint had a thriving youth ministry at that time. The youth group met in the basement of the church. The ministry was called "The Pipe". I always thought it had to do with the Pipe organ, but it turns out that the youth first met in "Paul's Pipe Shop". I don't know if that would pass session approval in today's church.

After graduating from Flint Southwestern H.S., I attended Mott College for a couple of years playing on the golf team. We had one good season making it to Division III national championship in Florida. There we were beaten quite handily by powerhouse Florida and Texas teams. I recall some of them making it to the PGA tour.

In 1985 I left the cold winter of Michigan for Tequesta, Florida. I worked as an assistant golf professional at Turtle Creek Club for about two years and then found myself not really knowing what direction I should go. I was fine, but my mother was in a panic. "Who leaves a good job with no plan?" I found myself taking some odd jobs and then for some reason was drawn to Emergency Medical Services. I worked on a local rescue squad where the unknown and chaos of emergency calls was exciting. My very first call was a full-term pregnancy that was delivered at home in the living room. I recall the page coming through and thinking, "You've got to be joking". All went well and the new mother almost broke my fingers when I offered my hand to brace the contractions. What a valuable lesson that stuck with me. Keep your hands busy during a delivery.

My shift happened to be on the night Hurricane Andrew came ashore in 1992. We thought we were prepared for what was forecasted to be a closer landfall in Palm Beach County. We ran several respiratory emergencies as the storm came across. The drop in barometric pressure as storms intensify is a real thing for those who have difficulty breathing. I've respected Hurricanes ever since.

I continued with EMS and then found myself in Nursing school. I was drawn to work both in prehospital and in the ER. While in nursing school I met Michelle Colonna who I got to know better through study groups and clinic rotations. That first sighting in the lecture hall was, "Ohhh, hello there". I convinced her to take a class that was a mission trip to Guatemala in the summer of 1995. We became closer and in 2 years we were walking down the aisle of FPC in Tequesta. I soon found myself wanting to make another change. I met a local medical device rep and thought that could be a nice career change. I left the ER and EMS and started working for Siemens/Pacesetter. I was hired as a clinical support member attending surgeries and seeing patients in cardiology offices. I had the opportunity to take on more of a sales/technical role in the fall of 2003. We had two little girls by then and found ourselves moving to Vero Beach in December 2003. We all know how 2004 turned out in the early fall. Our move was great. Nice neighborhood and neighbors but selling wasn't coming easy. It was lean the first few months in Vero. Then Frances and Jean came through, and everything stopped.

We hadn't found a church home yet, but it was now time to find a church family. We had attended FPC one time before the hurricanes but were drawn back by how receptive the congregation was when we attended. We all made it through those next weeks and Gods Blessings and spirit was a large part in us getting back on our feet. The sense of community was now apparent when we all needed it.

There were several men at FPC who were great at always asking, "How are you doing?" They knew a young father with a wife and little girls needed to know that they cared and were there for us. I recall hearing Orel Hershiser tell me, "You know the Lord has bigger plans for you here?" He was planting the seed that you will be called to serve. At the time I didn't grasp what he was saying but have grown to know what he meant. It has been an honor to be asked to be an Elder and now a Deacon. The church family has helped us raise two fantastic daughters. I now know where my father went every month on a Tuesday night for an hour.
