

"And now these three remain: faith, hope and love."
1 Corinthians 13:13a

"And the greatest of these is love!" The Apostle Paul is the Evangelist of the Western Church. Paul strove to establish faith in Christ till His return. Whatever our views of Paul, his theology focused on the primacy of love.

Paul's definition of love is primarily focused on agape love, which is characterized by devotion and selflessness to others. In 1 Corinthians 13 Paul writes, that love is patient, kind, not jealous, not boastful, not arrogant, and not rude. For Paul, love is not just an emotion, but an action of the will. It is a self-giving act directed towards the good of another person.

2000 years later, Paul's radical call upon the Christian to embrace "agape love" remains counter cultural. When the word "agape" is used in the Bible, it refers to a pure, willful, sacrificial love that intentionally desires another's highest good. The broken nature of humanity would have us pursue the opposite of "agape love."

In the world we are so often impatient and not kind. We are jealous and prideful. The world around us is full of being arrogant and rude to others. Our world is full of selfishness. The world rejoices when others fail, when others are exposed to be wrong, and is resentful when it endures the same.

Paul reminded the earliest Christians, and us as well, that Christians must live differently. "Christ-like" agape love is an act of devotion and selflessness to others. In Philippians 2:3, Paul reminds us that we are to have the same mind that was in Christ, "Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility value others above yourselves." For Paul, this is the agape love in action.

Paul clearly had his strong opinions. His views were important and he was not timid in sharing them. Paul also understood that he was not correct in everything (the immediate return of Christ), yet, his principal focus was not on being "correct," it was on being "loving." Living the "action" of agape love was for Paul the principle way of being a faithful Christian.

In the days and months and maybe in the years to come, the world will continue in striving to have us act in ways that do not embody "agape love." Yet, if we are to be the faithful Christians of the 21st century, we are to be as counter culture as was Paul. To be a Christ follower, we are to resist pride, impatience, arrogance, rudeness, being unkind, and treating others as though they do not matter.

Paul is crystal clear, "Love is patient and kind; love is not jealous or boastful; it is not arrogant or rude. Love does not insist on its own way. Love never ends. Other things in this world ends yet faith, hope, love abide, but the greatest of these is love.

Let the light that guides us be "agape love" and we will endure even through the darkest valleys for Christ is with us! The Good Shepherd leads us to the greener pasturers!

November in the Archives:

From the Archives 1954

November 10,1954 As Chairman of the Memorials Committee [for the Sanctuary to be built] suggested that the Furnishings Committee send out a letter to the Congregation pointing out that in a new church it is the general practice that members have the privilege of giving certain of the equipment as Memorials. Memorials suggested were: pulpit, lectern, organ, piano, baptismal font, communion table, special pews, etc. At present, the pulpit and baptismal font have been applied for. The cornerstone is being donated by Mr. & Mrs. C.E. Cox.

November 1954: By vote of Session the Clerk [of Session] was authorized to sign a letter setting forth our planned progress toward full self-support. This letter to be approved by the congregation before signing.

November 1954: The Moderator [Dr. McAfee] reported that Mayor Allen of Dodgertown had told him that new Churches now being built in Vero Beach would be allowed to sell tickets to certain games this next Spring and retain the proceeds of the sales. It was suggested that the Young Adult group sponsor this and handle the sale of the tickets.

Presbyterian Men

Dr. Sam Rutland - About Storms, Hurricanes, Tornados and God's Plans By Phil LoGiudice



The Men's Fellowship was treated to a very interesting talk by Sam Rutland at a recent breakfast meeting. He began by saying that his topic would be storms, hurricanes and tornadoes and the different ways we react prior and during bad weather events.

He asked all of us if we were okay after the storm. He wanted to know if we lost power. He showed us his favorite flashlight that suddenly stopped working and a heavy-duty extension cord. He said he has several of the cords that are used when the power goes out and his generator is put to work. Using a small generator means choices need to be made. Do you want internet or air conditioning? He claimed that Mimi thinks it is time for a whole house generator, but that is a story for another time.

Another question posed to the men was how long their power was out and several guys said five days! Sam's power was out for three days. Then

So, when the extreme weather occurs, we ask ourselves, "Why Lord? Why?" and say "again?" Then he quoted from 1 Kings 19 about Elijah and how the wind tore the mountains apart and shattered the rocks before the Lord. But the Lord was not in the wind. Then came an earthquake, but the Lord was not in the earthquake. After the earthquake, there was a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire. After that there was a gentle whisper. And the voice said, "what are you doing here, Elijah?" Meaning that God wanted Elijah to get moving and do something.

Sam then said that it is human nature to question why these things happen. What is this all about and why does this happen to me and not them? The tornado hop-scotched and came near Sam's community. It destroyed a Methodist Church on the feeder road and several homes in Spanish Lakes, and five people died. His area was not affected, but a street nearby was decimated and made to look like a war zone.

So, the question was why were his neighbors affected and not him? We want to figure things out and determine if there is a Divine intervention. Are these things lessons from the Lord? Does it mean people choose to live in mobile homes and therefore suffer the consequences? Going back to the story of Elijah it should be noted that the Lord was not part of the wind, earthquake or fire. The gentle whisper told Elijah to get moving and do something. In our case we pray for our neighbors and ourselves.

We are tempted to believe that these bad events may be God's intention and His plan to address evil. We need to be careful when we pray so that we do not ask the Lord to spare us but choose someone else. We should not suspect Divine intervention when someone is spared, and another person was injured or killed. It makes for a very difficult situation when we want to explain God to others.

As Presbyterians we learn, and try to understand predestination, which begs the question of whether we truly have free will and are not subject to God's plan. Over the years people's understanding of the doctrine of predestination has softened a bit. Sam's talk this morning gave us a lot to think about: One, God is always with us. Two, Community and fellowship are God's ideas. Three, shutdown those who want to interpret God's intentions. Show them love and concern and be faithful.

Justice and Honor

The Justice and Honor Team of First Presbyterian Church is undertaking two special projects this fall. We are partnering with Crossover Mission to once again sponsor the Bicycle Project. School resource officers will identify students in need and those students will be eligible to receive a bicycle and a helmet for Christmas. This project brings joy to the hearts of children and much goodwill in our community as the bikes and helmets are handed out by uniformed School Resource Officers.

Along with Crossover Mission, we are sponsoring the Laptop Project this year. Students graduating from high school who are college bound and unable to afford a computer, are awarded a computer based on need. Last year Crossover was able to give a handful of computers out, but with our support, hopefully there will be a larger number of computers available to be given to these students.

The bicycles cost around \$75 apiece and the computers cost around \$500 apiece.

What is Crossover Mission?

Justice and Honor Team of First Presbyterian Church, works closely with organizations in the community which seek to help children get a better start in their life journey.

Crossover Mission, started in 2014 - ten years ago - helps the kids who need us most to become successful adults through a program of year-round basketball training and one-to-one academic mentoring. Our kids often live in difficult family situations and are surrounded by violence and drug abuse. Because of this, they are at risk of school drop-out, gang involvement, and incarceration. Crossover Mission redirects their lives by providing structure, accountability, positive role models, and exposure to broader life experiences
