

## Celebrating Easter: The Atonement



The great Easter proclamation is that "He is Risen!" And the response is shouted, "He is Risen Indeed! Easter represents that great defining moment of Divine and human history when God intervenes so that the chasm between God and humankind is removed. When Jesus comes out of the tomb, death is defeated, and new life is affirmed.

Historically this great act of God's radical intervention is known as the "atonement." Through the atonement, God acts in ways that we, as sinful humankind, cannot. Thus, Easter is not about what we do; Easter is al-

ways, and forever, about what God does for us!

There are many understandings of the atonement. The early church understood the atonement as "ransom." Humankind is bound by sin, yet Jesus paid all the cost of our sins. When the Apostle's Creed speaks of Jesus descending into hell, it is the ransom that God gives so that we might be freed. This was the reigning concept of the atonement for the first thousand years of Christian history.

This atonement concept changed with St. Anselm (1099) who wrote of the atonement as a substitute for our sins in order to reinstate the honor of God. Satan holds nothing over God and God has the right to act in God's own creation as God pleases.

John Calvin expands substitutionary atonement. It is not simply a matter of God's honor being reinstated. The primary issue is that God cannot abide with sin. Humankind has fallen so short of God that humanity cannot possibly come close to repaying God for our sins, only God can. Thus, Christ comes to earth as fully human and fully God, receives our punishment, and God's demand for justice is fulfilled. Remember, Jesus stated, "I did not come to condemn the law, I came to fulfill the law."

In one way or the other, this remains the dominate concept of the atonement which is the great act of God that we celebrate on Easter. The graphic above is what I call "napkin theology;" theology that can be drawn on a napkin. In the graphic, we as humanity are separated from God. The chasm is too wide for us to traverse. Christ intervenes on our behalf so that we might be able to "cross" to God. The cross becomes the bridge, not by what we have done, but as a result of what God has done for us. As the Apostle Paul says in Romans 9:16, "It does not, therefore, depend on human desire or effort, but on God's mercy."

This Easter, remember, our celebration is not about us; it's about what God has done for us! Happy Easter 2023!

This editorial was in the Press Journal on Wednesday, March 1, 2023 on behalf of the Justice and Honor Team in response to hate propaganda that was distributed in Indian River County against the Jewish community. We stand in solidarity with our Jewish brothers and sisters, as well as all citizens of our diverse community.

Our motto is Stop Hate, Start Kindness

#### "When Hate is Normalized All Americans are Threatened."

The Justice and Honor Committee of First Presbyterian Church, Vero Beach applauds the Press Journal's coverage of recent antisemitic attacks on fellow Americans and our democracy on the Treasure Coast. One might assume that in 2023 we as a people have grown beyond leaving hate-filled message bags on homeowners' driveways. Sadly, we would be wrong. As Law enforcement and the ADL tells us—some still find enjoyment in distributing hate, intended to demonize any group not resembling their own. And such incidences are rising.

The Justice and Honor Committee of First Presbyterian Church strongly condemns the actions of those spreading hate propaganda on our doorsteps. We stand with our Jewish brothers and sisters, and all who are victimized simply because they do not look, act, or worship the same as others. As Christians, our mandate comes from Jesus of Nazareth



who said, "Love one another, as I have loved you". We have decided to choose love. As Americans our mandate is reflected a pledge often recited, "One nation, under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all." Thank you, Press Journal, and Josephine Gon for the sober reminder: "Our democracy is threatened when hate becomes normalized. This is not a Jewish problem to solve." We intend to help in finding a solution.

"The Presbyterian Church honors women who give outstanding service to the church and to the ideals of the Presbyterian organization. Today we are going to present this Honorary Lifetime Membership to one of our own. (con't)

She came to our church in 1994 when she was appointed Dir. of Music/Organist. She and her son joined the church soon after. During the time she held this position, she started the cherub and youth choirs, increased the adult choir, started the handbells, Orff Instrument Band, and ran Vacation Bible School. In 2001 she was approached with an offer to purchase an Allen Renaissance Organ for our sanctuary. She set up a planning committee with this donor and established an organ fund. When it was installed, she performed with other musicians at the dedication of our beautiful pipe organ.

In retirement she serves as a curator of the handbells program, works with Jacob Craig to reorganize the music library and volunteer at the 1st Pres Preschool reading to the 4 & 5 year olds. She is outgoing Corresponding Secy. of the Presbyterian Women.

This honor is long overdue and so for her outstanding service I'm proud to present this honorary pin to Judith Taylor. This comes with a contribution in her name to the PW's Scholarship Fund."



## Profile of a Presbyterian Woman: Lorie Rudolph, Director of First Presbyterian Preschool

For the past seven years, the First Presbyterian Preschool has quietly gained a reputation for excellence in the community. It has more than fulfilled the promise to elevate Christian preschool education in Vero Beach and has become a successful self-sufficient entity and a valued part of our church family. At the onset, the preschool created division within our congregation, and, for some, a fear that it would detract from our mission. Calm reassurances, practical studies and surveys convinced those skeptics and our preschool opened the doors in 2015. Since then it has continuously filled the classrooms and with the addition of aftercare; it is now a vibrant child-centered mainstay of our church.



The Captain at the helm of this endeavor is Lorie Rudolph, the Preschool Director and Mother Hen to a staff of 13 teachers and administrators. With children ages 2 yrs. – 5 yrs., the classrooms are exciting places of learning with carefully selected and trained preschool teachers. Hundreds of children have benefitted from this caring community of faith. So, who is Lorie Rudolph and how did she end up as the Director of our First Presbyterian Preschool? Born and raised in Syracuse, NY, Lorie and her younger brother lived with their hard-working parents, her mother, a music teacher devout in her Roman Catholic faith and her father - owner of a men's clothing store who celebrated his Jewish heritage. Lorie calls it a blended faith family. She was active in the youth fellowship group at Holy Cross Catholic church, taught sailing on Lake George, played piano and was active in the arts/drama program. After high school graduation, she attended nearby Alfred University graduating with an Elementary Education degree. She married a long-time Syracuse friend, Randy Rudolph in 1980.

Unable to find a teaching job at that time of low school enrollment, Lorie worked at her father's store for five years, learning the retail business and eventually becoming the Head Buyer when the store expanded to Women's clothing. She worked as a substitute teacher and taught Sunday church school at Holy Cross. Randy worked in insurance. The family expanded with two sons, Barry and Harrison and then their daughter, Marley.

Lorie continued to work in education whenever possible. She worked with the Catholic Charities early morning program, as well as an afterschool cooking class for disadvantaged youth in the inner city. Then, with their children grown, Lorie and Randy had a rare business opportunity with his insurance company to move to Florida. In 2015, the Rudolphs left snowy Syracuse for the south. Unfortunately, Randy's business position fizzled and once again, Lorie found herself scrambling to find employment. She answered an ad for a VPK teacher ("What is VPK??, she questioned") in the Kid Zone preschool in Port St. Lucie and started mid-year. This required that she have certification so she trained in the Voluntary Preschool Kindergarten program offered by the state of Florida thus earning her state certification. While she enjoyed teaching the 4 years old in the VPK, she found the daily commute difficult and at the end of the school year, she resigned and began looking again for employment.

The First Presbyterian preschool was in its fledgling first year when they hired Lorie for the VPK position. "They took a chance on me", she smiles. And the next year when the director unexpectedly quit, Lorie was interviewed by Anne Adams, FPC Christian Education Director. "I knew I could do it. My years acquiring business acumen, teaching in a variety of education positions as well as working with teachers, parents and children, prepared me

well" She took over as director in 2016.

The job of Preschool Director is multi-faceted--administrator, social worker, personnel manager, master of complicated State certification requirements, evaluator, and sounding board for complaints, joys and successes. It has been a perfect match and our school is thriving!

Sadly, in 2021, husband Randy contracted Covid and died very suddenly. Lorie was not allowed with him at that time. "it was a blessing in some ways". The church, she says, was wonderful during this stressful time, supporting her and the teaching staff during the Covid years when other preschools closed. She especially appreciated Pastor Tim and Pastor Michael York.

Lorie lives with her two children, son, Barry, a techie and daughter, Marley now teaching in the Allapattaha Flats k -8 school in Pt. St. Lucie. Son, Harrison is an attorney working in Washington, DC. She is devoted to our First Presbyterian Preschool children and to our church. Fate brought her here but she has earned the love and respect of all who know her. God bless Lorie Rudolph!
