

### **Scriptural Recall: I Freeing and Powerful Tool**

In his book, "Hostage Bound, Hostage Free," Presbyterian pastor Benjamin Weir reflects on being kidnapped and held captive for 14 months in Beirut by a group of Shiite Muslim extremists beginning in May of 1984. In this amazing book, Rev. Weir examines his captivity and reflects on the pain of being imprisoned while also, surprisingly, and faithfully, finding small cracks of personal freedom. One small freeing experience was Rev. Weir's remembrance of scripture.

For most of Rev. Weir captivity, he was held in solitary confinement. He saw no one, had no human interaction, and was not even allowed to have a Bible. During this time, Rev. Weir decided to reflect on scripture that he could remember. He began by remembering the order of the Books of the Bible. He then remembered the great stories and accounts of scripture beginning with Genesis, the Torah, History of the Old Testament, the Gospels, Paul's Letters and Revelation. He finally began to recall as many verses as possible of scripture that he could remember.It surprised him just how many passages he could recall.

And as Rev. Weir recalled these passages of scripture, he realized just how helpful and meaningful they were. When he was in times of dark sadness, he recalled Psalm 23:4, "Yea though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, thou art with me, your rod and your staff, they comfort me." When he wept when he missed his family and former life, Rev. Weir recalled John 11:35 that when Jesus heard of his friend Lazarus's death, "He wept."

When he had deep anger toward his captors, Rev. Weir remembered Matthew 5:43-45a, "You have heard that it was said, 'Love your neighbor[a] and hate your enemy.' But I tell you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, that you may be children of your Father in heaven."

The power of just one memorized verse of scripture can be powerful and freeing, especially when you desperately need it.Just as Rev. Weir realized power and freedom amid his captivity, we too can be empowered as we recall memorized scriptures to apply to our present condition.

Beginning on Memorial Day, First Presbyterian Church will invite you to participate in a day, "One Verse" devotion. Everyday throughout the summer, you will receive a verse of the day to reflect upon, pray over, and simply "ponder." These verses will come with little or no commentary, so as you read them, reflect upon them and, if you can, memorize them for use in your daily life.

Colfers know that club selection is critical in playing the game. You must have the right clubs in your bag. In construction, the builder needs the appropriate tools for the task at hand. So, it is with scripture! We desperately need the right passages in our quiver.

Plan to join in this simple yet freeing discipline from Memorial Day through Labor Day. A little memorization also keeps our brains active and engaged which, according to health study, aids memory health.

Here is a sample of what you might receive. 2 Timothy 3:16, "All Scripture is Godbreathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, . . . "If only we remember that beginning portion, "All Scripture is God-breathed," is that a good thing? Look to use the simple devotion and grow in your knowledge of God's Word to you.

Claude Bolling's Toot Suite for Trumpet and Jazz Piano that was premiered by French virtuoso trumpeter Maurice Andre in 1980 is an important work in the trumpet repertoire. At present, there is limited research regarding Toot Suite. Almost all of the six movements within Toot Suite are performed on a different instrument: C trumpet for Allegre, Eb trumpet for Mystique, Bb cornet for Rag-Polka, Bb piccolo trumpet for Marche, Bb flugelhorn for Vesperale and Bb piccolo for Spirituelle.

#### The 14th Annual Wheels and Keels Exotic Antique Car and Boat Show By Phil LoGiudice

This year our congregation celebrates the First Presbyterian Church of Vero Beach's 70th anniversary. One of the original founders of our church is an avid collector of fine automobiles. John Schumann brought his Ford GT Coupe to the Wheels and Keels foundation's 14th Annual Antique and Exotic Car and Boat Show as a part of their two-day fundraising event. One hundred-fifteen entries, by invitation only, were parked on the greens at the Moorings Country Club golf course.

All proceeds from the weekend are used to support several Treasure Coast charities. There are 13 organizations that the foundation currently supports.



Many of these charities support youth groups who focus on youth boating, the Music Angels Foundation for children, and Special Equestrians of the Treasure Coast for special needs individuals. Among several others, they also support Meals on Wheels and the Navy Seal Trident House. Since its inception in 2009, Wheels and Keels has donated over \$710,000 to local charities.

Awards are given to the best entry in 14 classes. Additionally, a special Chairman's Choice award is given as well. This year the Chairman's Choice Award was presented to John Schumann and his 2016 Ford GT Coupe. The Ford GT is a mid-engine two-seater sports car manufactured and marketed by American automobile manufacturer Ford. It started in the 2005 model year in conjunction with the company's 2003 centenary. It is a tribute to the famous Ford GT-40 race cars. The second-generation Ford GT became available for the 2017 model year.
