#### Some aspects of Stanford Erickson's life as told to Phil LoGiudice

Stanford's warm personality and listening skills were readily apparent when we first met. We have shared great memories of the 1950's in San Francisco. Both of us enjoyed Herb Caan's columns in the Chronicle. We loved the hot dogs at Woolworth's. Later I learned that he was a published author of several books. Additionally, he and Jane Weise edited, The Psalms from a Christian Perspective, written by Rev. Dr. George L. Earnshaw.

When Stanford decided he would try his hand at writing non-fiction books, he made sure he honored God with the first one. It took a couple of years of research and two years of writing. How to Be Wiser Than King Solomon was published in 2011.

Stanford has always been interested in wisdom and what constituted wisdom, and who could be considered wise. He said, "I had never understood why the poem Ecclesiastes, attributed to King Solomon in the Old Testament, was considered wise. I thought Ecclesiastes was Solomon's attempt to justify a life gone awry. It illustrates how knowledgeable, shrewd, and somewhat Machiavellian the writer was. Wise, yes, but wise in how to get along in the world, wise in things of the spirit, not so much."

About ten years earlier, Stanford had written a poem titled Ecclesiastes: A Modern Sequel that rebuts King Solomon's epic poem chapter by chapter. Few people have read the original poem, so Stanford included it in his book How to be Wiser Than King Solomon, which not only is a biography of King Solomon but points out that Solomon's disregard for commands and laws established by God ended up tearing apart the kingdom of the 12 Hebrew tribes.

Stanford says he really did not accept Jesus as his savior until he was 33 years old, and he accepted Him as his Lord about three years later. Once that happened, by the grace of God, he was determined to put Jesus first and his worldly career a distant last and he has had quite an amazing worldly career.

After graduating from University of California at Berkeley, Stanford was hired to be a feature writer for the San Francisco Examiner. He later wrote features for the San Francisco Chronicle, while obtaining a Masters in English from San Francisco State University. Then the Army called, and he spent 15 months in the Republic of Korea working as a reporter for Stars & Stripes.

During the next ten years, he worked as a reporter, managing editor, columnist, editor and bureau chief for McGraw-Hill Publications in San Francisco, Chicago,

New York City and Washington, D.C. He covered Congress, several U.S. Presidents and other world leaders. McGraw-Hill sent him to Columbia University to obtain a master's degree in business.

Later he was a speech writer in Washington, DC, headed up public relations worldwide for Sea-Land Service, the largest containership company in the world, was recruited to be editor-in-chief and then general manager of Knight-Ridder's Journal of Commerce in New York City, bought and managed publications for The Economist Magazine Group, bought Farm Journal with some investors for himself, and for ten years has been a consultant turning around distressed media companies.

Stanford explained, "What has been odd about my worldly career is that after I put God first, my career really took off and I obtained jobs that really transcended my abilities, which forced me to depend on God's grace even more. Putting God first also taught me to put my family and others before my career. Looking back, nothing I have accomplished in my career has been as rewarding as having loving wives and loving children." Both of his sons are graduates of Wheaton College, strong in their Christian faith, and are lawyers.

His first wife of 36 years died of ovarian cancer. "When we discovered her cancer, I quit my job and primarily took care of her for three years before she died. It was the best thing I ever did since she had made so many sacrifices for me as we moved from place to place." He never thought he would marry again until he met Nancy a couple of years later.

Stanford has always had a heart for the Jewish people. "Jewish people have always taken care of me for some reason. I always wanted to write something that might be useful to them. Nancy is Jewish. Somehow, I felt that God brought her into my life not only to heal a saddened heart but to help me better understand the heritage and traditions of the Hebrew people. We were married by a Rabbi and in our Ketubah, in which we write our vows to one another, we pledged to respect each other's religion."

Stanford joined First Presbyterian Church fifteen years ago. He sang in the choir for thirteen years, served as an elder, and is a member of the Men's Fellowship Group.

Writing is in his DNA. His book Mama's Boy Presidents: Why Do We Keep Electing Them was published in 2012. He edited three books on the Holocaust, and with Jane Weise edited Rev. Dr. George Earnshaw's commentary on the 150 Psalms titled The Psalms from a Christian Perspective. In 2014 he published The Kind of Women Who Could Be President of the United States. In 2018 he published Ranking U.S. Presidents from Washington to Trump. In 2020 he co-authored a novel with Richard Kerr, former Deputy Director of the CIA, titled The Door. At the end of this year Kerr and he will publish another novel titled Murder for Dummies. Next year he will publish a book of poetry titled Becoming Me and a nonfiction book titled The American Ship Company that Changed Trade Worldwide. A play he wrote, The Kennedys–An American Tragedy, is being considered for a Off Broadway production in New York City.
